## SARA BAY COUNTRY CLUB

### DONALD ROSS, TOMMY ARMOUR, BOBBY JONES HISTORY OF THE SITE FOR 1995 STATE AMATEUR

Sara Bay Country Club, a Donald Ross course in Sarasota which traces its heritage back to the era of Tommy Armour and Bobby Jones, will host the 1995 Florida State Amateur Championship.

Scheduled June 22-25, Florida's oldest continuous sporting event will offer contestants in the 77th State Amateur a unique peek into Florida's golfing history.

Opened in January, 1926, the club now known as Sara Bay was originally called Whitfield Estates because it was built on land which had been the estate of Richard Whitfield.

Later, it was re-named Northgate and in 1940 the name was changed again to Sarasota Bay. This was shortened to Sara Bay in 1964.

Armour was the first golf professional at the club and Jones was the assistant sales manager for the property.

A historical review of the club as well as newspaper reports of the time tell of a opening day match January 23, 1926 in which Armour and Jones beat Jim Barnes and Johnny Farrell, 4 and 3.

Like most real estate and golf properties in Florida, there were numerous economic ups and downs in the

ensuing 20 years. The property was virtually abandoned during World War II but was rescued in 1946 by Bert Montessor, a noted golf professional.


In the late-1980s, a master plan was developed to restore the course to its original design, including replacing the 48 bunkers which had been removed over the years by club members apparently more concerned with maintenance costs and playability than in preserving history.

The front nine was renovated in 1991, the back nine in 1992.

Indeed, with revisions directed by Brian Silva of Whitensville, MA, the recognized leading authority on Donald Ross courses, the old master himself would appreciate the restoration when it was completed.

According to Sara Bay General Manager Dennis Ahearn, when Silva walked the course several times, he envisioned what Ross might have had in mind in his original design.

Then, remarkably, when a Sara Bay member, John Schaub, moved across town and into a house on the

property, pallotboards to which Ross' original blueprints were attached during the construction were discovered in the attic.


It was amazing, Ahearn said, how close Silva's concept of Ross' work had been.

Many of these original blueprints have been framed and are on display in the lobby of the clubhouse.

Steve Dietz has been the head professional at Sara Bay the past four years after working eight years as an assistant to former head professional Joe Stencik.

The late Frank Strafacci of Miami Beach won the only other State Amateur played at Sara Bay, in 1957. Coincidentally, his son, Frank D. Strafacci of Miami, is currently the secretary-treasurer of the F.S.G.A.


We feel this is being achieved, if slowly, still surely, which in turn enhances the recognition of the F.S.G.A. and its mission around the state.

This was accomplished to a degree in two very visible ways; the end of the year awards banquet at historic Sara Bay in Sarasota in 1993 and at a symposium for volunteers last April in Ocala.

We have also been successful in getting the Southeast Challenge Cup matches reinstated. This is a competition among teams of golfers representing Florida, Georgia and Alabama.

## The Executive Director's Word...



I have held my input until the Southeastern Challenge Matches were over. This past weekend our Florida team put together a masterful team effort and were in hospitable hosts to Alabama and Georgia. The final totals were: Florida-41, Georgia-29, Alabama-14. The cycle remains the same. The host state has

always won their matches. We have every intention of breaking that cycle next year when we travel to Georgia.

There have been numerous questions regarding how the team selection was determined. We used the following USGA events: U.S. Open, U.S. Senior Open, U.S. Amateur, U.S. Senior Amateur and U.S. Mid-Amateur. Fifty points were awarded to each level of qualifying. Additional points are awarded for: making the cut in Opens and for making match play in the other events. Each match won also garners 50 points. The following State Championships are awarded points for qualifying: State Amateur, State Senior, State Match Play, State Mid-Amateur. Fifty points each for qualifying and an additional 50 points for making the cut or match play. Points are awarded on a fixed scale for the State Senior and State Amateur final places. Each match won in the Mid-Amateur and

State Match Play earn 50 points per win. We do not award points for Four-Ball play. We also do not award points for social organizations such as the Southern Seniors. Also any senior who earns points in the State Amateur Championships other than the senior will have them added to their total. We welcome any senior player who can compete with the "younger generation". Same holds true for U.S. Open, U.S. Amateur and U.S. Mid-Amateur qualifiers. We have a token point award for top ten finishes in major national amateur events such as the Western Amateur, Southern Amateur and Dixie Amateur. There will be a definitive chart of how you can earn points provided in early 1995, when we mail the entry forms for the new schedule. Have a good winter season and we will see you sometime next year on the golf course.

members are George Givens of the Connecticut Golf Association, Bill McCarthy of the Metropolitan Golf Association in the New York City area, and Lorraine Thies of the Arizona Golf Association. We met in January in Arizona and in May, September, and October at USGA headquarters in Far Hills, NJ.

Currently, the GHIN system serves 7,200 clubs and 1.6 million members in the U.S. In Florida, we have seen a strong, 16+ percent growth in the use of GHIN the past year, which means I spend a lot of time giving demonstrations and installing the systems at clubs around the state. The Florida totals to date: 170+ clubs serving over 52,000 golfers.

Small wonder it seems I sometimes have to reintroduce myself to the staff and get a guided tour of the office each time I return to the F.S.G.A. headquarters in Sarasota.

Because of the changes in GHIN procedures, we look forward to greater use statewide. And if your club is not a part of the USGA Network, not part of the latest state-of-the-art technology, which costs but a few dollars per year per golfer, check with your golf professional or club manager to see what can be done to join.

Providing the most accurate Handicap system available and all of the other aspects of tournament play at your club should be looked upon as a service, not just a revenue-producer.

After returning home from my fourth meeting this year of the USGA's Tournament Pairings Program Committee, it's clear that "user-friendly" will be the buzz word for 1995.


That's because of the USGA's \$600,000 commitment to software improvements for 1994 on the Golf Handicap and Information Network.

The addition of cart signs, plus improvements in scorecards, pairings and starters lists should, we believe, enable a tournament chairman to produce, for example, the entire package for the next day for a field of 200 golfers in 20 minutes.

Whereas in the past the Tournament Pairings Program was perceived as too hard to use by laymen, our emphasis was to change and improve the way information was presented. The result was that we went from "user-unfriendly" to "user-friendly."

The committee is headed by chairman J.P. Messick of the Sun Country Golf Association in New Mexico. The other

### MICHELLE BERG

A part-time job which started August 15th is becoming more than that.

## NEWBURN'S HOT START WAS ENOUGH TO WIN

Harold Newburn used a marvelous opening round to vault from the third flight to the overall title in the 11th annual State Handicap Championship at the Mission Inn Resort, Howey-in-the Hills.

A nine handicap golfer at Calusa Country Club in southwest Mami, Newburn shot par-72 on the newly designed Las Colinas course. This was especially remarkable because it was so windy and the greens were uncommonly quick. It gave Newburn a plus-9 for the round in the Stableford point quota event.

Though the wind was not so much a factor, Newburn and many of the other contestants struggled a bit the final round on Mission Inn's original course, El Campeon, as the hilly terrain, trees, bunkers and water took a toll.

Newburn had a minus-3 for the day but his cumulative total of plus-6 for 36 holes was good enough. He finished one quota point ahead of Doug Jenkins from nearby Leesburg. Jenkins had plu-3 and plus-2 for a 36-hole total of plus-5.

This is how points were awarded: eagle, 4; birdie, 3; par, 2; bogey, 1; and a double bogey or higher, 0. Then the contestants were assigned a quota by subtracting their handicap from 36.

Flights one through four played the blue tees, the fifth and sixth the whites. Thus, players in the fifth and sixth flights were not eligible for over-all honors.

Other flight winners were Eddie Bannister, Winter Park, first, even; Doug Jenkins, second, plus-5; Tom Hurst, Miami, fourth, plus-3; John Cartee, Port St. Lucie, fifth, plus-9; m and John Mallonee, Fort Pierce, plus-18.

## BOB RANKIN AGAIN STATE'S TOP SENIOR

Bob Rankin of Palm Harbor outlasted John "Hammer" Ward of Orlando to win the 34th annual State Senior Championship at Innisbrook Hilton Resort, Palm Harbor.

Playing, in order, the Sandpiper, Copperhead and Island courses, Rankin posted 68-73-79--220, Ward 72-73-76--221. Philip Hubacher of Parrish, playing ahead of the leaders, was third on 70-77-75--222.

Clyde Gibson of Hobe Sound had the only other score under 70 for the weekend, leading Rankin by a shot after the first round with a 67. Gibson eventually tied for fifth at 226.

The field was flighted by entering handicaps, with the championship and super seniors (70-and-over) further divided after the second round.



## CHRIS COUCH STRONG AT SAWGRASS

University of Florida senior Chris Couch of North Lauderdale won the State Amateur for the second year in a row. It was the first time in a decade there had been a successful defense of the F.S.G.A.'s oldest championship, or since Tom Knapp of Tequesta won in 1983-84.

However, other than the same name on the Clarence Camp Trophy two years in a row, there was little similarity between Couch's two victories. At Bay Hill in Orlando in 1993, Couch had a 72-hole total of 12 under par 276 for a 14-stroke advantage. It was the lowest winning score in 13 years, or when Rick Pearson, then of Bradenton, now on the Nike Tour, shot 274 at Feather Sound in Clearwater in 1980. This year at Sawgrass Country Club in Ponte Vedra Beach, Couch totaled 292, four over par. That matches the highest winning score since the 77-year old championship switched from match play to stroke play in 1961. Also winning at 292 were Bob Murphy of Nichols, now on the Senior PGA Tour, in 1966 at Lost Tree Village in North Palm Beach, and Palm Beach Attorney, Mickey Van Gerbig in 1977 at Bay Hill.

His awesome performance a year ago at Bay Hill showed Couch can play the game. So what led to such high scoring this year? Primarily it was due to some 10 1/2 inches of rain the previous week that prevented mowing of the rough either before or during the championship. The rough was estimated to be at least 4-6 inches, higher than any U.S. Open ever, and surely deeper than at any time the PGA Tour's Tournament Players Championship was conducted on the same course for several years through 1981. Club members and other volunteers were recruited as spotters on many holes throughout the course.

By comparison, David Peoples of Orlando, now on the PGA Tour, won the State Amateur at Sawgrass on 289. The four-day stroke average this year for the 71 players who made the 36-hole cut was 79.696.

Couch opened with 70 and was never headed. He added 73, 78 and 71 to win by a half-dozen over U.F. teammate Paul Tesori of St. Augustine, who carded 73-78-77-70--298. Mike Barkley of Clearwater, a Northwest Airlines pilot, was third at even 300 on rounds of 76-76-73-75. Doug Lacrosse of Tampa, the only other former champion in the field, tied for 33rd at 312. Couch's margins were one after the first round, four at the halfway point, three through 54 holes and six at the end.
