FLORIDA WINS SOUTHEASTERN CHALLENGE

For the first time in the history of the Southeastern Challenge Matches, a visiting team took home the silver trophy. The annual competition between teams representing Alabama, Georgia and Florida was held in October at Sea Island Golf Club. In each previous Challenge Match, the host team had been victorious, but this year your Florida team broke the trend. Final standings were: **Florida 33 1/2, Georgia 27 1/2 and Alabama 23.**

The format of the Southeastern Challenge is similar to the Walker Cup, including Four-Ball, Foursome and Singles matches. Teams are composed of fourteen players, ten in the Regular Division and four Seniors. The state association may use any process it chooses to select its team. Florida uses a points system to rank players, and eleven of the fourteen team members come from the top of the points list (the others are by "captain's choice").

Standouts in the opening Four-Ball matches were the teams of Steve Earsley/Doug LaCrosse, Bill Erwin/Jack Veghte and Rennie Law/Ron LeClair, each of whom won both points available. At the end of Four-Ball the standings were Florida 10 1/2, Georgia 8 and Alabama 2 1/2.

Alabama and Georgia closed the gap in the afternoon Foursome (alternate shot) matches. Rick Cloninger and Steve Riviere turned in the best Florida performance winning one match and halving the other. By the end of the first day, our lead had nearly vanished. Florida 16, Georgia 15 and Alabama 11.

The outcome hinged on the Sunday morning singles matches (technically, "Three-Ball"). Captain Cal Korf led off with dependable Doug LaCrosse, who swept his two opponents 3-2 and 1 up. Other players winning both their matches were George Roat, Rick Woulfe, Rennie Law, Bill Erwin and Bruce Scamehorn. Florida picked up 17 1/2 points in singles, as Georgia earned 12 1/2 and Alabama 12.

Next year's Match will be hosted by Alabama and points have already been awarded toward the 1996 team. Because of the dates of the 1995 Senior and Mid-Am Championships points from these events roll over into 1996.

USGA National Team Tournament

Florida finished second in the Centennial Team Tournament hosted at Lake Nona C.C. in Orlando. 47 states participated in the men's division and 48 in the women's division. This was the inaugural event conducted by USGA. It was so well received and the recipient of many accolades that it will probably become a permanent USGA scheduled event, although probably will be every other year. The Florida team, which was selected from the points list, was composed of Doug LaCrosse, Jim Taylor and Rick Cloninger. The low two scores each day were used by each state for the 54 hole tournament. Florida led after the first day, but were relegated to second place by Virginia after the second day. Virginia played outstanding golf on the final day to hold on to first place. Mississippi had a final day surge and finished third, one stroke behind Florida and one stroke ahead of Tennessee. New York was 5th, another stroke back. We are very proud of our team's effort and this is another reason for you to strive for the top part of our points list.

We look forward to seeing each of you during the 1996 tournament season.

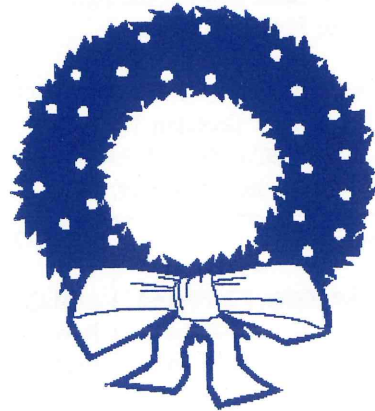

HOMETOWN GOLFER WINS 1995 STATE AMATEUR

Exhibiting an uncanny short game, Sara Bay member Mark Leetzow became the 1995 State Amateur Champion after seven grueling play-off holes. Mike Bodney of Ponte Vedra Beach, the leader since his first round 68, birdied the final two holes in regulation play to finish the 72 holes at 4-under par 284. He then watched Leetzow match his pars and birdies for six holes in the play-off, the first in the State Amateur Championship since 1990.

John Corzilius of Nokomis was in contention before a bogey at the par-5 No. 17 cost him a chance to tie the leaders. A three-time former champion, Clearwater's Jack Veghte, turned in a sterling four-under 68 on Sunday, the low round of the day. Veghte, very much a threat to win at age 60, finished in a tie for third place with Corzilius and Longwood's Jason Opal.

The historic Sara Bay Country Club course proved to be a solid test for the best amateur golfers in Florida. Designed in 1926 by Donald Ross, Sara Bay hosted the 1957 State Amateur won by Frank Strafacci, Sr., of Miami Beach.

WORLD WOODS G.C. HOSTS '95 FOUR-BALL EVENTS

Rick Woulfe of Ft. Lauderdale teamed with Frank Strafaci, Jr., of Miami Beach to win the State Four-Ball Championship at World Woods Golf Club in late July. Following a first round 67, the winners played the Pine Barrens course in 65, enough for a two-stroke victory over Eric Schreiber and Mike Lefebre of West Palm Beach.

Because of the growing popularity of the Four-Ball, qualifying was required for the first time. Seven regional tournaments produced the fifty teams which competed in the Championship and the 100 teams eligible for the Four-Ball Tournament the following week [see item below about the 1996 format].

South Florida also produced the winners of the "Tournament" at World Woods. Miami's Bruce Fitzpatrick and Samuel Martinez, who lost a play-off for a spot in the Championship at the Doral qualifier, fired consecutive 67s to post a one stroke victory. Marshall Ames and Tommy Roe of Clearwater shot a tournament-low 65 on Sunday to finish second. Fred Ward of Crestview and his brother Hammer of Orlando took third.

FOUR-BALL FORMAT IN 1996

Due to the enthusiastic response to the regional tournaments, they will be continued in 1996. The Four-Ball "Tournament" will not be repeated, however, and twice as many teams (108) will qualify for the Championship. Another change will be that each team may only play in one qualifying event, as very few players entered more than one regional tournament in 1995.

As before, the top ten finishers from the 1995 Championship are exempt from qualifying next year. These teams may play in the qualifier of their choice, but will not take a spot away from those attempting to qualify.

LACROSSE ADDS MID-AM TO TITLE COLLECTION

Doug LaCrosse has long been one of the most highly respected players in Florida, but one title had eluded him. He had lost the 1994 Mid-Amateur final at Palma Ceia, but he had his name on most other important trophies in the state. This year the fast greens and strong winds at Laurel Oak in Sarasota were right up Doug's alley.

LaCrosse survived several close matches before defeating Match Play champion Bruce Scamehorn 2-1 in the final. Both finalists were under par on the cool, windy morning, but the winner simply made fewer mistakes.

Other notable performances included David Boesel eagling the par 5 18th hole to make the play-off for the last position in match play, Scamehorn holing out a wedge for eagle on the par 4-12th hole 70 to take medalist honors in the stroke play competition.

Note: In 1996, there will be 36 holes of stroke play to determine a match play field of 32 players (a cut to the low 48 and ties will occur after the first 18 holes).

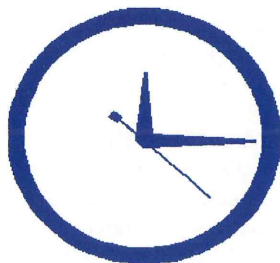

Perhaps the most annoying aspect of tournament golf is slow play. Many golfers take considerably more time reading greens and choosing clubs during competition than they do when playing at their home courses. I have never heard a golfer say that he enjoys a five-hour round. If no one likes to play slowly, why does the problem persist?

There have been hundreds of articles published on this subject over several decades. It seems that slow players either are not aware of their irritating tendencies or are simply inconsiderate of others. In 1996 the FSGA is going to make a concerted effort to help the tortoises correct their problem. The following is the Pace of Play policy which will be in effect at all FSGA Championships and qualifying events.



OUT OF POSITION DEFINED

Any group will be considered out of position if it reaches any place on the course more than one starting time behind the preceding group; e.g., an open par 3 or par 4 hole, or when the preceding group is on the putting green of a par 5 hole when the group in question is on the teeing ground.

GROUP OUT OF POSITION

If a group falls out of position immediately after all players have left the teeing ground, but before any subsequent strokes have been played, a Committeeman will inform the players that they will be monitored and timed.

MONITORING

Any player in a group out of position who takes more than 40 seconds to play a stroke on two occasions will be advised of that fact and notified that if he exceeds 40 seconds on one more occasion (a total of 3 "bad times"), he will automatically incur a penalty of loss of hole in match play or two strokes in stroke play. Any player who takes more than 40 seconds on two more occasions (a total of 5) will be disqualified.

TIMING

The timing of a player's stroke will begin when he has had reasonable opportunity to reach his ball, it is his turn to play, and he can play without interference by another person or another ball.

Except on the putting green, if a player has reached his ball, it is his turn to play and there are no distractions, timing will begin after he has had a few seconds to select his club. Any time spent walking for measuring purposes will count as time taken for the next stroke.

On the putting green, the timing will begin after a player has been allowed a reasonable amount of time to lift, clean and replace his ball, repair ball marks and remove loose impediments.

Note: An extra ten seconds will be given for (a) the first player to play a tee shot on a par 3 hole, (b) the first player to play a second shot on a par 4 hole, (c) the first player to play a third shot on a par 5 hole and (d) the first player to play a stroke on or near the putting green.

I suggest that you ask a friend to time you during your next round. Those of you who are slow players may not be fully aware of the time you take for each shot. If you are taking more than 30 seconds, you need to start getting your yardage and otherwise preparing for your next stroke before it becomes your turn to play.

Of course, if you are a fast player there is nothing to worry about. And thanks for your help in keeping play moving!

Golf and the Environment by Tim Hiers

Collier's Reserve opened in January of 1994. From the beginning, the plan was to design and build a golf course within a private, gated community, which would meet the criteria for designation as an Audubon Cooperative "Signature" Sanctuary course. The property is 448 acres of woodland and wetlands, with the Cocohatchee River winding through it, and planned for up to 228 single-family homesites. The project, including the Arthur Hills designed 18 hole golf course utilizing approximately 80 acres of maintained turf, was created as a world wide model of environmental excellence. The course was completed according to the Audubon Society's planning and environmental standard and Collier's Reserve was awarded the first ever "Signature" status in February of 1994.

The Audubon standards focus on five major areas: water conservation, wildlife conservation, habitat enhancement, energy efficiency and waste management. A naturalization plan was developed for Collier's Reserve taking into account existing conditions, a conceptual design and a program for establishment and long-term maintenance of the property. As this up-scale private community continues development of its homesites, the spirit of the "Signature" status and the environmental guidelines are incorporated into the homeowners' architectural and landscape plans. On several occasions, homeowners have called us seeking advice regarding the landscape ideas.

Native vegetation is planted in most perimeter areas of the golf course and community common grounds; it gives the golf course the look and feel of a wildlife sanctuary and reduces much of the labor intensive maintenance. Native aquatic plants such as spikerush, arrowhead, thalia, needlerush and pickerelweed, among others, have been planted to help sustain a natural environment for lake and wetland wildlife. Snags are protected and newly dead trees lacking that aged look are sculpted into snags to harbor birds such as osprey and woodpeckers. Throughout the property, lightning protection is installed on structures (Clubhouse, maintenance facility, fuel island, golfer's shelters, etc.) and on trees of significant size and location.

A state-of-the-art Natural Resource Management Center (NRMC - golf course maintenance facility) was built with efficiency and conservation in mind. Traffic flow in and out of the Center's offices, equipment storage and shop areas all reflect efficient movement of people and equipment. Even the covered fuel island -- which contains a wash pad for equipment with a water reclaim system that separates gas, oil, dirt and grasses washed from the equipment -- is energy efficient. The cover over the fuel island provides shade for above-ground fuel storage tanks to reduce evaporation, helps keep rainwater off the containment pad, and also provides shelter and shade for our crew while they clean and wax their equipment before putting it away. Concrete pavement around the facility reflects sunlight, thereby helping to reduce heat. We have had over 100 visitors from other golf courses, agribusinesses, as well as non-industry related businesses, tour our NRMC and the golf course to "see how we do things". It is gratifying to receive positive feedback relating to the overall operations practices we use here.

One key to the success of Collier's Reserve is its Integrated Plant Management (IPM) program. Adhering to the principles of the IPM program creates an environment for turfgrass to sustain a vigorous, healthy plant life and reduces the use of pesticides -- which helps reduce cost. The IPM Control Center is a separate building (the hub of IPM activity) which houses and recycles all chemical containers and rinsate used on site. The Center's burglar and fire alarms include a battery backup system. Another unique feature of Collier's Reserve's turf management practices is its prescription irrigation system (watering only where it is needed) and its commitment to recycle everything possible.

Since our opening, we have an on-going, concerted effort to educate the local community about the special qualities of the property. Over 400 students, ranging from kindergarten through college level, have visited here to learn how environmentally sensitive a golf course can be and what a valuable contribution to the surrounding community it makes, including facts like: the average golf course produces enough oxygen to sustain 4,000 - 7,000 people annually, and how research is demonstrating that when properly constructed and managed, golf courses do not pollute our water with pesticides or fertilizers. Also, they learn that all golf courses are not water wasters and wildlife killers but, in fact, contribute to the quality of human and wildlife around the area. We have, through various media, informed the community that we are ready and willing to grant access to Collier's Reserve to provide a first-hand look at the positive side of golf courses and their commitment of continuing demonstration of sound cultural practices. Our other visitors have included politicians, commissioners, environmental groups, government agencies and local and national media.

The status of Collier's Reserve has put us under a microscope which presents a great opportunity and a challenge. Much of the responsibility for maintaining the high standard of excellence falls on the shoulders of the Assistant Golf Course Manager, Matt Taylor. Other key staff that contribute to the continuing standard of excellence are: Mike Koopman - Equipment Manager, Kirk Koopman - IPM Specialist, Tom Wignall - Irrigation Specialist, and Pepper Terry - Administrative Assistant. These people, plus a staff of 13, keep Collier's Reserve a manicured showcase golf course community where both man and nature share the land and life -- on a natural scale.

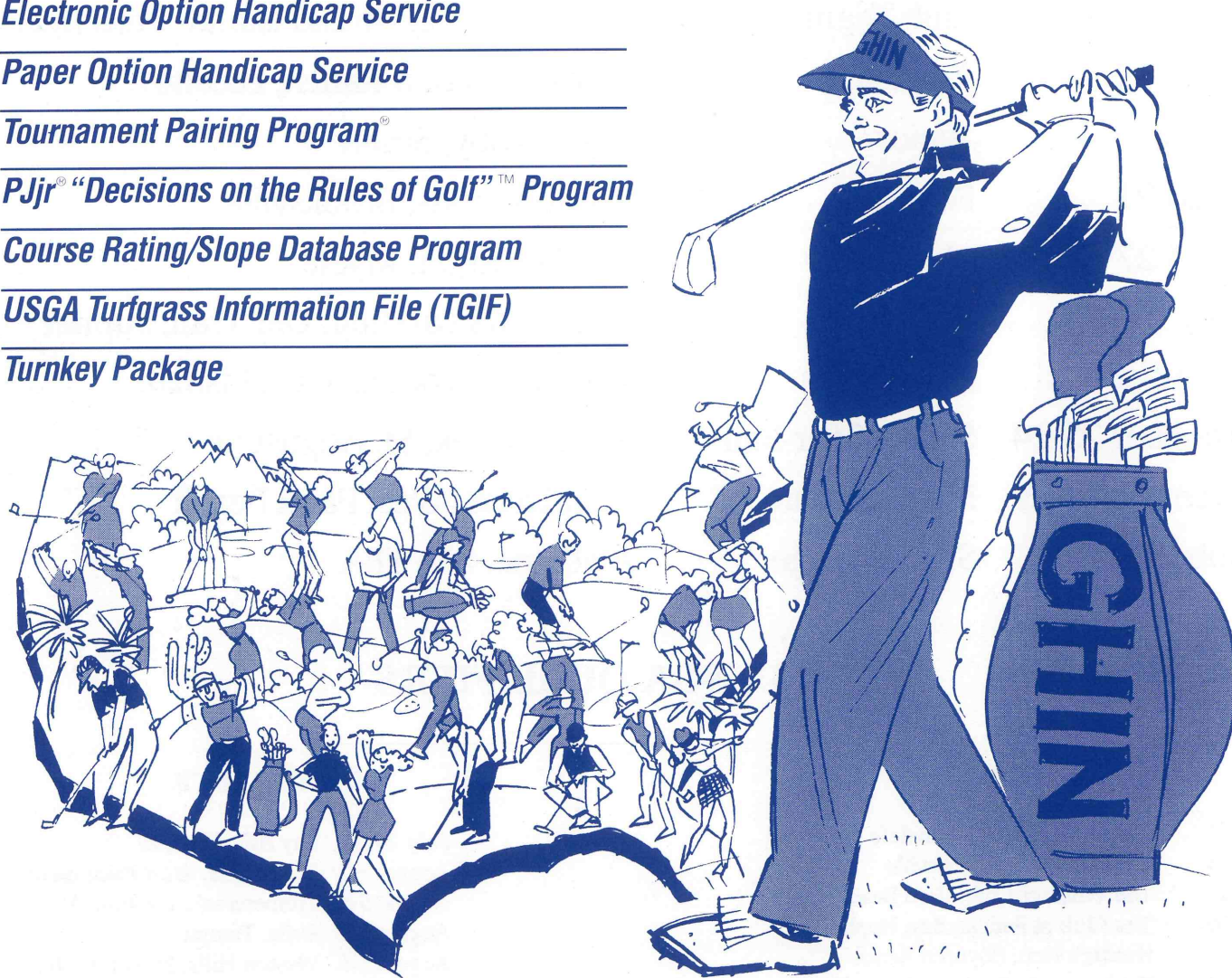
