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1986 SCHEDULE FINALIZED

In addition to the great golf courses listed on our regular Championship schedule we have offered you an opportunity to play some of the truly outstanding golf courses throughout the state in our State Amateur and State Mid-Amateur Qualifiers. We have four new golf courses among the 17 qualifying sites. Some of them are already drawing rave reviews.

Inside we have provided you with stories and summaries of our major events of 1985. Perhaps one of the most exciting golf matches was provided in our Life Begins at Forty Championship at the Meadows. The final day of the 54 hole event turned into a display of tremendous golf and shotmaking by two of the most competitive and talented golfers in the state. Between Ron Clayton of Sarasota and Jack Veghte of Clearwater they have probably won close to two hundred individual golf tournaments and championships. To recap the final day, Jack Veghte birdied the par 5 15th hole to even the match. Ron Clayton responded with a 20 foot birdie putt from the fringe on 16 to regain the lead. Jack birdied the 200 yard par 3 17th hole with a tee shot three feet from the cup to again even the match. As the two were approaching the 18th green one of the players, who had already finished, was heard to comment: "Are these guys playing the same golf course we did?". Ron eliminated the possibility of a play-off by knocking his 160 yard approach shot eight feet from the hole and with nerves of steel rolled the putt into the heart of the cup for a birdie. For those of you who played the Meadows you can appreciate the quality of the golf on those four strong finishing holes. Scores by age division and flights are listed inside.

STATE AMATEUR

Cary Splane of Middleburg captured the biggest victory of his career when he won the State Amateur Championship at Sawgrass.

Splane, now a junior at the University of Florida, came into the tournament as a longshot but was able to convincingly defeat some better known collegiate players - Florida teammate Scott Dunlap, Ronnie McCann of the University of Miami, Nolen Henke of Florida State University and Len Mattiace of Wake Forest University.

Splane's 72-hole total at the Ponte Vedre layout was 287, seven better than runnerup Mattiace. Dunlap was third at 295, followed by McCann and Henke at 296.

"It's the best I ever played in a big tournament," said Splane. "I really hit the ball well, and I hung in there. The course was long and windy."

Splane's opening 73 was good for a share of first place with McCann. The rest of the way, Splane held an outright lead. He added a 72 the second day and then, after shooting a 69 in the third round, went ahead by four. He coasted home the final day, finishing with a 73 and winning by seven.

"I've been working harder on my game," explained Splane, "and I've been playing in more and more competition. I hadn't really competed on the national level until last year."

Splane grew up in Fort Lauderdale, where "golf was just another sport. I played everything, and I never really started concentrating on golf until recently."

Now, he says, "I'm feeling much better about the game. I felt good all the way in the State Amateur. I really proved something to myself."

Sawgrass, even when the Par 72 layout is not played from the extreme back tees, is an intimidating test of golf. The final round scores will attest. Scores after Round 4

MID-AMATEUR

Some winners of major tournaments appear almost to be pre-determined, such as Tom Watson in the 1982 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach. It took a miraculous chip-in on the 71st hole, but the miracle seemed appropriate for Watson.

So, it was clear from the beginning that the State Mid-Amateur Championship was Ronnie Tumlin's tournament.

Tumlin, a 36-year-old player from Palatka, took medalist honors, survived a tough first round confrontation in match play and then marched through three more matches. Nobody could stop him.

The event - designed for golfers at least 25 years old - was played at beautiful and demanding Jupiter Hills Golf Club in Jupiter. Tumlin grabbed everyone's attention by opening the 36-hole medal play portion with a 71, four better than anyone else in the tournament.

"I hadn't been playing much golf, and Jim McCumber (former FSGA president) talked me into going down two days early," explained Tumlin. "I got a little better each nine holes we played, and Jim finally said, 'Hey, your game is coming on pretty strong.'"

Tumlin shot a 79 on the second and final day of medal play, tying Bob Kouwe of Tampa for medalist honors. "It's a golf course that can really jump up and grab you," said Tumlin. "If you don't watch out, you make 16 pars and two triples."

No problem, for Tumlin defeated Kouwe in a sudden death playoff to earn the No. 1 spot in match play.

In his first match, Tumlin ran into George Roat of Orlando. "George played superb golf," said Tumlin. "He played better than any other opponent I had."

No problem, for Tumlin made a tricky five-foot putt on the 18th green and then watched Roat miss a two-and-a-half footer. They went into extra holes, Tumlin winning on the 19th.

Next he beat former state amateur champion and FSGA president Jack Veghte of Clearwater. His victim in the semifinals was Bill Hamilton of Palm Beach, who later in the year would team with Tom Knapp of North Palm Beach to capture the State Four-Ball Championship.

In the final, Tumlin overcame John Parsons of Palm Beach Gardens by a 3-and-2 margin.

Tumlin was on a mission, and he explained his Rodney Dangerfield philosophy by saying, "In my part of the state, we don't get much publicity. The most satisfying thing for me was to beat all the guys I read about

every week."

Later in the year, though, Tumlin hurt his back at the Tournament of the Americas in Miami and hasn't played since. "I'm hoping I can do something about it," he said. "I've been miserable."

BLOOMINGDALE REPEATS

The drama surrounding the State Club Team Championship has grown tremendously in the last few years, and the event has emerged as one of the most closely watched, hotly contested tournaments in Florida.

Bobby Stricklin, a natural promoter with a personality resembling circus magnate John Ringling, has been responsible for part of this growth.

Mostly, though, the surge of interest in the event has been provided by the phenomenal success of Bloomingdale Golfers Club near Brandon.

After Bloomingdale won its second straight title, Stricklin, general manager of the Club, said, "Just tell everybody we're the New York Yankees of golf."

Looking ahead to the 1986 tournament at Grenlefe Resort, Stricklin mused, "The FSGA is going to have a tough time getting the trophy back if we do this one more time. We might just forget to bring it back."

Bloomingdale is a club focused entirely on golf—no swimming, no tennis.

"Our guys are young, strong and hit it a long way," characterized Stricklin. "This is middle class Joe's golf club, a working man's golf club. Our guys eat and sleep golf. We have 100 members with handicaps less than 10."

Heading into the Team Club Championship at Fiddlesticks in Fort Myers, Bloomingdale was expected to be closely challenged by the 1983 champion—Avila of Tampa.

"We have a great rivalry with them," explained Stricklin. "It got so intense that Denny Rouse, who has memberships at both clubs, finally refused to

play for either team because everybody was fighting so much."

Rouse had played on Avila's 1983 champion, then switched to Bloomingdale's 1984 winning entry.

"Our biggest problem," said Stricklin, "was determining who would play on our first team and who would play on our second team."

No matter. After the first day of competition, Bloomingdale's two teams ranked 1-2. Avila eventually moved into second, but Bloomingdale's A team won the championship by 3 strokes.

Leading the winning team was Wayne Rudzewicz, the tournament medalist with a 143 score. Other members of the team were Jerry Coran, Curt Madson, Gary Stickl, George Swistock and Wyatt Meyer.

Bloomingdale's Steve Smyers, who played on the club's B team, ended up tied for seventh among all the players in the event. Chris Murman, another member of the B team, is now the club match play champion at Bloomingdale.

"This is fun," said Stricklin. "Maybe the idea of knocking us off will spur some other teams to get in the tournament. I sure hope so, because this is one of the best tournaments in the state."

FLORIDA LEGISLATION THREATENS PRIVATE CLUBS

The National Club Association is alerting all Florida clubs to a severe threat posed by legislation to be considered soon in Tallahassee.

S.B. 1, introduced by Senator Jack Gordon (D-Miami Beach), and its companion bill, H.B. 104, introduced by Representative Michael Friedman (D-Broward County), would deny liquor licenses to private clubs that "withhold membership, facilities, or services from any person on account of race, religion, sex or national origin." NCA believes this legislation (usually referred to as the Gordon Bill) is not only an unconstitutional infringement of the freedoms of association and privacy of private club members, but that it is so sweeping and imprecise it would affect every club in Florida regardless of their membership admission policies. It is feared that men's grills, ladies' tea rooms, differential tee-off times, and even all men or all women golf tournaments would be imperiled by the Gordon Bill.

SPORTSMANSHIP

I would like to share with you a copy of the letter to the Oregonian Sports Editor written by Peter Jacobsen in response to the Davis Cup Code of Conduct.

"I am proud to be a member of possibly the most respected organization in professional sports, the PGA GOLF TOUR. There are no guaranteed salaries, appearance fees paid or any other financial inducements given to compete. Play well and you can win big money, play poorly and you win nothing. Sport at its grandest level. The love of the game and the challenge of its competition. May the best man win.

No one is bigger than the game of golf, or the game of tennis for that matter. The 'thumb the nose' at the world attitude shown by some of the top tennis players disturbs me and obviously others, including Mr. Merlo (Merlo wrote the Davis Cup Code of Conduct). I commend and applaud his controversial stance for what he believes in; playing the game with proper conduct for the respect of the game and those who love it.

Nobody threw McEnroe or Connors off the U.S. Davis Cup team. They refused to play by the rules set down. I really don't think Mr. Merlo is interested in insuring a U.S. victory. I'll bet that he wants to see the best tennis played and the best team to win.

On the same note, I was recently named a member of the U.S. team in the upcoming Ryder Cup matches against the Great Britain-Europe team on Sept. 13-15. There is no money available, just national pride and great golf. I can assure you during the matches there will be no temper tantrums, obscenities or humiliation of referees or officials. Sportsmanship is what the great game of golf is all about.

It's a shame that there had to be a standard code of conduct for these tennis players in the first place. It really isn't whether you win or lose, it's how you win or lose. This is the point Mr. Merlo is trying to prove to these individuals. I agree with Bunny Mason. I'd like to see McEnroe join the PGA TOUR, just so we could kick him out.

Hogan, Nelson, Snead, Palmer, Player, Nicklaus, Trevino, Watson, Bal-lesteros. Maybe a few lessons could be learned from these gentlemen. Grace under pressure. That is what sports . . . and life . . . are all about. Tennis needs people like Harry Merlo desperately. If they don't want him he'll fit right in to the world of golf."

SLOPE — THE BETTER HANDICAP SYSTEM

You have all heard so much about slope, but it has been difficult to describe simply. Many of the northern state golf associations have implemented slope and it has become immensely successful. Next year (1987) slope will be available nationwide. We attempted to test slope in Florida in 1985 in Palm Beach county. We were unable to obtain the cooperation of all the handicap computation service companies, therefore the test did not commence on schedule. We will commence the slope test in Palm Beach and Martin counties with the growing number of clubs who are on the GHIN handicap system and those who have their own handicap systems which can reconfigure to the slope handicap system. I will try to provide a simple explanation of SLOPE by using the Metropolitan Golf Association guide for their courses (all of which are on SLOPE this year).

THE PROBLEM

Your handicap is a number, and that number is an indication of your ability to play golf. This handicap assures equitable competition between players of varying abilities —assuming that all the players established their handicaps on similar courses. But, unfortunately, courses range greatly in difficulty and ratings do not totally address the discrepancies. This, as dubbed by the USGA, creates a "PORTABILITY PROBLEM"—that is, the problem of supplying golfers with handicaps that can be adapted to courses of varying degrees of difficulty.

The problem has been created by the old method of rating golf courses.

*For one thing they had been rated for scratch players only.

and

*The rating was based almost exclusively on the measured yardage of the course.

THE SOLUTION

To solve this problem, the USGA determined that courses should be rated for obstacles—in addition to an effective yardage factor.

Accordingly, ten obstacles were identified and criteria of difficulty defined to establish a 0-10 rating for each obstacle for each hole.

Additionally, it was determined that ratings should not only be made for scratch players—as now—but also for the average player—referred to as a "Bogey" player.

We have managed to rate a majority of the golf courses in Florida under the new USGA Obstacle rating system, but there are many courses to be rated and many more that need to be re-rated. There are several rating teams throughout the state, both men and women. Bill Baker is in the process of training more rating teams, notably J.A.G.A. We hope to have most of the courses rated by the end of this calendar year.

IMPLEMENTATION

Each course now has, or will have, two ratings—one for the scratch player and one for the bogey golfer. It is the relationship between these two ratings that determines the "slope rating" of a golf course.

In order to make handicaps from different courses comparable, a common level must be achieved. This level is the national average of all courses rated—"SLOPE" of 113.

In other words, no matter where a golfer plays, his score will be adjusted to a level of the national average **113**.

When SLOPE is implemented all handicaps will be RE-CALCULATED. Based on the new calculation, each golfer will have a new USGA handicap. This new handicap will be officially referred to as "USGA HANDICAP-SLOPE"

TERMINOLOGY

1. USGA HANDICAP-SLOPE — The official handicap which has been adjusted to the national slope average of all courses - 113. The new handicap will no longer be rounded

off, but will be expressed as a decimal (i.e. you may be 15.3 rather than a 15). The new USGA handicap-slope should be looked on as an "index" since you will only use it to refer to a chart (course handicap table) to look up how many strokes you will receive when playing that particular golf course. In general, when you play a course that is above the national average in difficulty, you will get more strokes and when playing an easier golf course, you will get fewer strokes.

2. COURSE HANDICAP TABLE — Each course will have its own individualized table which is based on the slope rating the course was assigned. Each golfer should take his USGA handicap-slope to the table to determine his course handicap for his round.

3. COURSE HANDICAP — Based on course handicap table. It is the handicap you will play with at that course.

4. HOME COURSE HANDICAP — This is the handicap to be used only at the golfer's home course.

EXAMPLE

If you were to play from the back tees at Winged Foot West (which has a slope rating of 141) and your USGA Handicap-Slope is between 6.1 to 6.8 your course handicap would be 8. If your handicap-slope is between 15.7 and 16.4 your course handicap would be 20.

SUMMARY

There are only two points that the individual golfer has to remember in order to play with his new USGA HANDICAP-SLOPE.

1. Know your USGA HANDICAP-SLOPE.

2. Consult the course handicap table to determine your handicap for the course you are ABOUT TO PLAY.

REMEMBER — You do not play with your slope handicap. It is merely an index used to refer to a course handicap table.

NON-RATED COURSES

If you play a course that is not using the Slope Handicap System, use your home course handicap.

When a guest, whose home course is not using the Slope Handicap System, plays your club, use his normal handicap.

If all works well we plan to have a

COURSE HANDICAP TABLE for each of our member clubs who have had a recent USGA Obstacle Course Rating. This would be available for calendar year 1987. This is a very realistic goal as most of our member clubs have received a rating and we just need to re-compute the rating to provide for decimal handicaps. This will be automatic for all of our clubs which are on the GHIN handicap system.

RULES QUIZ

The following quiz on the rules of golf was again extracted from the rules quiz given to the 1986 Metropolitan Golf Association rules officials. The questions were prepared by Dr. Richard Silver, who is a long time recognized rules authority with the MGA. Answers will be found on page 8. I would like to hear from anyone who answers all the questions correctly, other than Sam Smidt. Also let me know if you only miss one. Thanks.

1. In stroke play, a player finds a ball out of bounds and thinks it is his ball. He picks it up and returns to the spot from which his original ball was played and plays it. He then finds his original ball in bounds.
 - A. The original ball is in play and the player incurs a two-stroke penalty for playing the ball he found.
 - B. The original ball is in play and the found ball is picked up with no penalty involved.
 - C. The found ball is in play with a stroke and distance penalty. The original ball is picked up.
2. In stroke play, there is a bunker between a player's ball and the hole. The player walks into the bunker and removes a rake which has been stuck into the sand on his line of play. As he walks out of the bunker, he smooths the footprints he made, restoring the line to its original condition.
 - A. The player incurs a penalty of two strokes.
 - B. The player has proceeded properly.

3. In stroke play, a player's ball comes to rest just in front of a divot hole. The freshly displaced divot is just nearby and the player replaces it and steps on it before striking the ball.
 - A. The player has proceeded properly.
 - B. The player has incurred a penalty of two strokes.
4. In stroke play, a ball lies just outside a bunker. The player takes his stance in the bunker and when playing the shot touches the sand in the bunker on his backswing.
 - A. The player incurs a one-stroke penalty.
 - B. The player incurs a two-stroke penalty.
 - C. The player incurs no penalty.
5. In stroke play, a player's ball is in bounds. To play the ball, the player must stand on an artificially surfaced road that is located out of bounds.
 - A. The player is not entitled to relief.
 - B. The player is entitled to relief, since the artificially surfaced road is an immovable obstruction.
6. In a match, a player's ball is on his opponent's line of putt and the opponent requests the player to mark and lift his ball. Instead of complying with the request, the player proceeds to putt out.
 - A. The player loses the hole for putting the ball instead of marking and lifting it as requested by his opponent.
 - B. The player loses the hole for taking a practice putt.
 - C. The player incurs no penalty, but the opponent may ask him to replay the stroke in correct order.
7. A player plays a stroke in a bunker, but fails to get the ball out of the bunker. He smooths his footprints and the irregularities made by his stroke before going to play his ball.
 - A. The player incurs a two-stroke penalty.
 - B. The player incurs a one-stroke penalty.
 - C. The player incurs no penalty.
8. In stroke play, a player's ball is on a putting green with casual water intervening between his ball and the hole. In obtaining maximum relief, he drops the ball off the green into the rough.
 - A. The player has proceeded properly.
 - B. The player incurs a two-stroke penalty.
 - C. The player incurs a one-stroke penalty.
9. A player hits a ball into a lateral water hazard. In taking his drop, the player wanted to use the option of playing from the opposite side of the hazard, but the opposite margin was marked in yellow as a water hazard.
 - A. The player is permitted to drop a ball on the other side under the procedures for a lateral water hazard.
 - B. Because the opposite margin is marked with a yellow line, the player may not use the procedure for playing from the opposite side.
10. In match play, a player marks the position of his ball on a putting green. The marker is so positioned that it could be of assistance to his opponent. Accordingly, the player prepares to move the marker two putterhead-lengths to the side, but the opponent says that he wants the marker left where it is.
 - A. The opponent's request is valid and the marker may not be moved.
 - B. The player controls the placement of the marker and may move it.
11. A player's ball comes to rest in ground under repair. In the act of searching for it, he accidentally moves the ball.
 - A. A player incurs a one-stroke penalty for accidentally moving his ball and the ball is replaced.
 - B. The player incurs no penalty.
12. In stroke play, a player tees his ball and, before striking it, breaks off a branch of a tree which interferes with his swing.
 - A. The player incurs a penalty of two strokes.
 - B. The player has proceeded properly.



IN MEMORIAM

Nate Schine succumbed to a final battle with lung cancer on September 5, 1985. Nate was a Director of FSGA for several years. He also was an avid competitor in many of our championships. One of Nate's proudest achievements was when he shot his age—71—at Palma Ceia Country Club two years ago. I am taking the liberty of sharing with you a quote from Nate's gracious and charming wife, Marion. "For the twenty-five years we have been in Tampa, FSGA has played a very important part in keeping Nate the vibrant, happy person we all knew him to be. For this I am grateful." I personally consider myself privileged to have known Nate and considered him to be a good friend. He will be missed.

FLORIDA OPEN

This year the Florida Open will again be conducted by the North Florida PGA, South Florida PGA and FSGA at Innisbrook. There will be qualifying throughout the state for approximately 130 spots. The top ten amateur places will each receive a \$350 merchandise certificate and the top 20 amateur places will all receive a sizeable award. FSGA has 8 exemptions - six go to the top six finishers in the 1986 State Amateur and two to the winner and runner-up in the 1985 State Mid-Amateur Championship.

STATE SENIORS

There was little doubt about the identity of the best senior golfers in the state.

Pursie Pipes of Boca Raton and Bo Williams of Ocala tied for first in the State Seniors Championship with 36-hole totals of 145 at exclusive Indian Creek Country Club. The next best score in the tournament was 151, six back.

Pipes and Williams then headed out for a sudden death playoff at Indian Creek, located on an island off Miami Beach. Pipes won the championship when Williams three-putted the first green.

It was the second Florida senior title for the 67-year-old Pipes, who is in the oil business and who lost a portion of three fingers on his left hand in an oil rig accident.

Pipes also is a former Illinois State Amateur champ, so his credentials are very strong. In addition, he is a member of the Indian Creek club.

Williams, though, was cruising along with a three-stroke lead until the 16th hole of the final round. He doubled bogeyed that hole, while Pipes birdied to draw even. They tied both the 17th and 18th holes.

Tying for third at 151 were Walter Baldwin of Tampa, Charlie McCormick of Winter Springs, Bill Allendorf of Orlando, Arnold Horelick of Boca Raton and Bill Scarborough of Jacksonville.

COMMENT The ball found out of bounds is in play under the penalty of stroke and distance.

Dec. 13-2/25.5

COMMENT If a player worsens his line of play, he is not entitled to restore the line to its original condition.

3. B. Rule 13-2
Dec. 13-2/5.5

COMMENT Replacing the divot is acceptable, but pressing down the divot is prohibited.

4. C. Rule 13-4
Dec. 13-4/1

COMMENT Since the ball was not in or touching bunker, Rule 13-4 does not apply.

5. A. Rule 24-2b
Dec. 24-2/19

COMMENT Immovable artificial objects off the course are not obstructions; therefore, the Rules provide no relief without penalty.

6. C. Rule 10-1C
Dec. 10-1C/2

COMMENT Rule 10-1c governs.

7. C. Rule 13-4
Dec. 13-4/33

COMMENT The player was able to test the consistency of the sand during his first stroke in the bunker.

8. B. Rule 25-1b (iii)
Dec. 25-1b/10

COMMENT The ball must be placed, not dropped. See General penalty Rule 22-01.

9. A. Rule 26-1c
Dec. 26-1/11

COMMENT Relief is determined according to the status of the hazard at the point where the ball last crossed the hazard margin.

10. B. Rules 8-2b and 22a
Dec. 20-1/11

COMMENT No mark shall be placed anywhere on the putting green to indicate a line for putting.

11. B. Rule 12-1

COMMENT A ball accidentally moved in ground under repair during search is replaced without penalty.

12. A. Rule 13-2
Dec. 13-2/13

COMMENT Although Rule 13-2 allows a player to eliminate irregularities of surface on the teeing ground, it does not allow him to break a branch interfering with his swing.

STATE JUNIOR

Jeff Foster of Ponte Vedra became just the third 15-year-old golfer to win the State Junior Championship when he fired back-to-back rounds of 72 at Indigo Lakes in Daytona Beach.

The other 15-year-old champions were notable, for they were Gary Koch and Len Mattiace. Koch is now

a member of the PGA Tour, while Mattiace plays for Wake Forest University.

Foster made 10 birdies in 36 holes, and in the process he overcame first round leaders Fred Simons of Winter Park and T.R. Bowser of Valrico.

Simons slumped to a 77 in the second round, tying Scott Ford of Lake Worth for second place at 146. Bowser closed with a 78 and tied for fourth with Michael Sposa of

Tamarac and Steve O'Neill of Zephyrhills.

Foster was 4-under each day after six holes, and he held up admirably on Indigo's huge greens.

"It was the best I've ever putted over 36 holes," he said. "It's funny, because I really didn't even think about winning until a lot of people came out to the 17th green on the
