BENTON WINS STATE JUNIOR

When Fred Benton of Jacksonville Beach sank a three-foot birdie putt on the third hole of a sudden death playoff, the thrilling State Junior Championship was finally over.

Benton edged Roger Kennedy of Pompano Beach for the title, although both played exceptionally fine golf over the Magnolia Course at Walt Disney World. Benton posted rounds of 72 and 70, while Kennedy had identical scores of 71.


Fifteen additional players broke 150, including 12-14 age group winner Eric Brito of Jacksonvill. Tom Tolles of Cape Coral was third overall at 145, while Dean Hiers of Lake Wales and Steve Lamontagne of Satellite Beach tied for fourth at 146.

Benton made a marvelous save on the first playoff hole, missing the green and then getting up-and-down with a spectacular pitch over a bunker and a four-foot putt.

On the decisive third hole, a par three, Kennedy missed a 15-footer before Benton sank his three-foot birdie putt. The winner hit the green with a 7iron shot.

Michael Bradley of Sanibel took the first round lead with a 69, but had a 78 in the closing round. Another 147 finisher, Greg Hyde of Miami Shores, had the opposite kind of performance by starting with a 77 and then improving to a 70.

Brito, the 12-14 winner, had rounds of 73 and 75 for a 148 total.

Golf fails to serve majority of youths

Despite junior programs, most youngsters aren't exposed to game

ary Nicklaus had an advantage when he began playing golf. His father, Jack, was his teacher.

"I started when I was 7 years old, going out with my dad," Gary said. "But I stopped for two years. My mother thought I was too young to get involved."

Now 14 and a scratch player, Nicklaus is competing in the 12-to 14-year-old division in the Florida State Golf Association's junior championship on the Magnolia course at Walt Disney World. He's 5 feet 9 and with blond hair looks remarkably like his father. His swing also is similar to golf's Golden Bear.

Yet having the game's top performer (over \$4 million in earnings during a sensational career) as an instructor wasn't enough to make Gary Nicklaus an outstanding player. He needed competition among his peers, too.

"I've been playing in Palm Beach Junior Golf Association events for about four years," Nicklaus said. "It's the best chance to play under tournament conditions."

There are numerous junior tournaments in the country, especially in Florida. But they don't begin to fill the needs of a majority of youths.

For the masses, greens fees and equipment are too expensive. Their parents don't participate in the game, or they find courses crowded with adults who gripe at kids slowing play.

In the past, a youth became a caddie in order to practice golf. But with carts, caddies are becoming an endangered species.

"We could have a lot more junior golfers than we do now," said

Frank Smith, president of the National Golf Foundation. "There needs to be an effort to get kids out onto the courses in this country. Kids can't learn if they can't find a place to play."

Thus, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co., golf is the nation's slowest-growing participation sport. From 1973-82, racquetball increased 334 percent and snow skiing 152 percent. Golf was at 2 percent.

This is a concern for golf executives. PGA Tour Commissioner Deane Beman, for instance, pointed out that only 2 percent of spectators at tournaments last year were under 18 years old.

In short with its lack of opportunities for juniors, golf isn't producing fans like other sports — baseball, football, soccer — are through their youth programs.

What's available now?

The American Junior Golf Association and the United States Golf Association sponsor tournaments throughout the country. The National Golf Foundation gives seminars in physical education classes, provides instructors for junior programs at private clubs and public courses and publishes how-to-play guides.

Through its Junior Golf Foundation (Jack Nicklaus is honorary chairman), the PGA of America promotes the game. It conducts introduction-to-thegame clinics, holds boys and girls championships and has a Clubs for Kids program. Last year, it collected 100,000 used clubs from golfers, shortened them and distributed them to kids who couldn't afford to buy them.

Also, at 90 percent of its tournaments, the PGA Tour conducts junior clinics featuring the game's top players.

Locally, the top youth organization is the Orlando-land Jr. Golf Association. It's a labor of love for its director, Richard Eckstein, who formed it 12 years ago.

"We have 241 players from 10-19 years old who will compete in about nine tournaments this summer," he said. "We've had one rules clinic and will have two more.

"We group the players by handicaps, not age. We have some players with handicaps as high as 100."

In addition to giving good young players tournament competition (his is one of only 12 junior associations in Florida), Eckstein provides a rare opportunity for high-handicap youths. Most kids who are starting the game aren't encouraged to compete in tournaments or to play, period.

Some Orlando-area pros conduct clinics for youths and make tee times available to them. A few clubs offer lessons and reduced rates to juniors.

And the YMCA is currently involved in a three-week program at Walt Disney World. From Monday through Friday, youths are bused to Disney's Golf Resort where they receive instruction and play the Wee Links course.

"It's top-notch for beginners because the kids are learning at their own levels and finding out that golf is fun and entertaining," said Eric Fredricksen, Disney's golf director.

Of course, anyone can play the Wee Links where clubs and balls are provided — there were almost 5,000 rounds on it last year.

But in general there isn't much available to the youth who wants to start playing golf, who can't afford private lessons or clinics and perhaps has no clubs

"It may be hard to get kids started in golf," Fredricksen said. "But once you expose them to the game, you've got them hooked."

The problem is giving youths that initial exposure. There is no Little League in golf.

Nicklaus' son among junior stars to watch

Many amateur golf tournaments start with the top players having the last tee times. That seems to be the case in the 36-hole Florida State Golf Association's boys junior championship set to start today on the Magnolia course at the Walt Disney World resort.

In the last foursome, starting at 12:32 p.m., will be Gary Nicklaus, the 14-year-old son of Jack Nicklaus. He is a scratch player who, despite competing as an eight-grader, helped North Palm Beach Benjamin capture the Class A title in the recent Florida State High School championships.

Nicklaus finished ninth in that tournament with a 5-over 149 for two rounds. In National Long-Drive qualifying, Nicklaus, a 5-foot-9, 145-pounder, finished second with a drive of 335 yards.

Nicklaus will be competing in the 12-14 year-old division along with Benjamin teammate Greg Krak, son of Mike Krak, golf director at PGA National in Palm

Beach Gardens. Last year's winner, Len Mattiace of Ponte Vedra, is in the 15-17 year-old group.

Two other members of the Benjamin team are in the 15-17 division — David Krak and John Reynolds, son of PGA National pro Mike Reynolds.

Dean Refram of Zephyrhills, son of the former touring pro, is in the 15-17 group. In the younger division is Steve Ferguson, son of Tom Ferguson, pro at Indigo Lakes in Daytona Beach.

The 15-17 division also includes 16-yearold Michael Bradley of Sanibel, who shot a 3-under-par 69 in the final round of the state amateur at Grenelefe to finish in a tie for third. Clearwater's David Veghte, 15 and the son of three-time state amateur winner Jack Veghte, also is in that group.

There are 100 entries in the older division and 26 in the younger group. In the 15-17 category, there are several Orlandoarea high school players.

It's the Florida State Junior Amateur Championships. The 36-hole tournament that runs today and Sunday will be the site of some awfully good golf. Gary Koch, who is seventh on the PGA money list this year, won this event three times when he was a junior.

A field of 135 players, the biggest ever, will be attacking the par-72, 6,400-yard north course. And the odds are that local players will come away victorious.

Exactly one-third of the field -

45 — is from the greater Palm Beach County area. The tournament has two age divisions — 15-to-17 and 12-to-14 — and each has its share of outstanding players.

"We have some absolutely great players," said Cal Korff, who is running the tournament, the 30th put on by the Florida State Golf Association. "Not many of the best juniors miss this. It is by far one of the best tournaments of its kind anywhere."

To wit, no less than 14 players named to *The Post's High School* All-Area team are competing.

Perhaps the best of the local players in the 15-17 group is a trio from Cardinal Newman High School. John Tighe, Mickie Gallagher and Doug Pearce were instrumental in leading Cardinal Newman to its first state golf title.

But that isn't to discount such players as Gary Nicklaus of Benjamin, who finished third last year at Disney World; Tim Shifflett of John I. Leonard and Jim Meda of Forest Hill

Other area players who figure to make the event a tight one include Buster Chapman of Fort Pierce Central High School, Jeff Stephens of North Shore, Eerick Kauppinen of Santaluces, John Reynolds of Benjamin, Gary Mawich of Twin Lakes, J.J. Sehlke of Spanish River, John Leighton of Martin County and David Pearce of Fort Pierce Westwood.



'Grown-up' Fred Benton is FSGA junior champ

When Fred Benton was 3 years old, his mother worked at a golf course pro shop and didn't want to leave her baby with a babysitter. So she would take him with her. It wasn't long before her toddler was out puttering around the course.

That early start in the game paid off for young Fred when he sank a four-foot birdie putt on the third extra hole to defeat Roger Kennedy of Pompano Beach in the FSGA State Junior Championship,

BENTON, FROM Jacksonville Beach, won it on June 24 at the Magnolia course at Walt Disney World. The 17-year-old rising senior at Fletcher High School shot rounds of 72 and 70 for a 2-under-par total of 142. Kennedy, son of Roger Sr., pro at Pompano Beach CC, posted 71-71. Third went to Tom Tolles of Cape Coral at 72-73-145.

Michael Bradley of Sanibel Island, who recently finished third in the FSGA State Amateur at Grenelefe-West, shot the low round of the tournament, an opening 69, but he closed with 78 to finish five shots behind.

In the 12-14 division, Eric Brito of Jacksonville, who will join Benton on the Fletcher prep team next year, won by six on 73-75. Chris DiMarco of Longwood finished second at 154. Steve O'Neil of Zephyrhills and Gary Nicklaus of North Palm Beach tied for third at 157.

For Benton, this was clearly his top moment in golf. He's trying to earn a collegiate scholarship, to Florida or Houston, he says.

"Coming in, I definitely felt I had a chance to win it," said Benton, who left immediately for Grenelefe and the North Florida PGA Junior. "This hasn't quite hit me yet. I'll feel it tomorrow.'

And he'll never forget it. In his only other brush with greatness, Benton qualified for the U.S. Junior Boys last year with 73-78 but failed to qualify for match play after 36 holes at tration in the final round. His opening drive the national site.

This is the second time around for Jacksonville's Fred Benton. When GOLFWEEK was only four months old--and he was nine years-he made the cover of our July 10, 1975 issue as an International PeeWee tournament runnerup. He was "Freddie" Benton then-but they do grow up.

In the Benton corner was Rick Famlin, who for 30 years was pro at the Ponte Vedra Club and who still today plays regularly with Jerry Pate's granddad, a man who introduced young-chap Jerry to the game. Famlin's moral support clearly helped Benton.

IN THE opening round, Benton scored 36-36, with three birdies on the front, a double bogey and bogey. On the back, he had one birdie and one bogey. His final round went 35-35, with one birdie and eight pars on the front and two birdies and a bogey on the

He didn't birdie one of the par 5s either

Kennedy, who also will be a high school senior, started young like Benton, at age 4. He's learned the swing well from his dad, a respected pro both as a player and golf businessman. The senior Kennedy has placed second in the Florida Open and represented the United States in the PGA Cup Matches, based on his play in the National Club Pro Championship.

Young Kennedy's best tournament performance prior to this was a seventh in the State High School Championships as a sophomore.

"I'm happy," Kennedy said. "I held it together. I haven't played that many big tournaments like this. I'm ready to play a lot more

At the 160-yard third hole, Benton put his tee shot in tight, to four feet. Kennedy also was on line, but just beyond. Kennedy missed from 20 feet, then Benton ended it.

Benton captures junior golf title

Fred Benton of Jacksonville Beach sank a 3-foot birdie putt to defeat Roger Kennedy of Pompano Beach on the third playoff hole and capture the Florida State Golf Association's boys' junior championship Friday on Walt Disney World's Magnolia course.

But a shot Benton made on the first extra hole was just as important to his victory in the 15- to 17-year-old division.

Eric Brito of Jacksonville, the first-round leader in the 12-14 division, followed his 1-over 73 with a 75 for a 148 total to win that title.

He had a 6-shot edge over Longwood's Chris Di-Marco, who rallied from an opening 82 with a 72 the best round of the day in his age group.

David Rowley of Boynton Beach finished third at 156 and Gary Nicklaus, the 14-year-old son of Jack Nicklaus, tied for third at 157.

In the 15-17 division, first-round leader Michael Bradley of Sanibel fell out of contention with a 78 after an opening 69.

Benton shot a 2-under 70 Friday for a 2-under 142

Kennedy 2-putted from 30 feet on No. 18 to finish with a second straight 1-under 71.

On the first playoff hole, Benton missed the green with his second shot.

But he hit a spectacular pitch over a trap to within 4 feet of the cup and made the putt to save par—and keep the match even.

The two 17-year-olds remained tied until the par-3 third hole when Benton hit a 7-iron within 3 feet of the pin and Kennedy put his shot 15 feet away.

Kennedy missed his birdie attempt, but Benton

didn't.
