## Palma Ceia site for state mid-amateu

One of the state's rare amateur match-play events will be played in Tampa next week when Palma Ceia Country Club plays host to the Florida State Golf Association's Mid-Amateur Championship.

The state tournament for amateurs age 25 and older will have a field of 100 players who advanced from 11 qualifying sites. Play begins Thursday with 18 holes of stroke play. The top 32 players advance to the match-play segment of the tournament Friday. The championship final tees off Sunday at 8 a.m.

And with the tournament's arrival at Palma Ceia comes local hope.

Palma Ceia, the historic **Donald Ross** venue, has proved to be a great frustration. The par-70 course plays at a unimposing 6,200 yards, but with small greens and out of bounds on the left side of many holes, it gives up birdies like they are old family heirlooms.

Local knowledge could be the best weapon in a player's bag.

"There is no question in my mind, anybody who knows that golf course and has played there over the years has an absolute, no-question-about-it advantage," said **Bob Kouwe**, who just happens to be a past winner of the Palma Ceiahosted Gasparilla Invitational.

"The name of the game at Palma Ceia is going out and making pars, and if you do, your opponent will self-destruct. If you don't know better, you think it's a little 6,200-yard course and you're going to make birdie after birdie. But it never happens."

If Kouwe's theory holds true, it is reason for high expectations, not only for himself, but area players Wyatt Meyer, Doug LaCrosse, Bob Thaxton, Frank Griffin, Max Castro, Rick Brown and Stuart Sierra, who have played the course.

Other Hillsborough players entered include Pete Andrews, Frank Griffin, David Hackstadt, Brian Hawke, David Langdon, Sam Lewis, Chris Matics, Joe McCandrew, Doug Reintgen, Mark Rodriguez and Bob Smith.

Pinellas golfers who qualified include Rick Anderson, Mike Barkley, Tim Cyr, Kevin Dyer, Jack Gleason, Jake Kevorkian, Chris Maxson, David McDowell, Scott Ranney, Tommy Roe and Scott Sabadosh.

The eccentrics of Palma Ceia aside, the match-play format itself could be a confounding experience for many players. Unlike stroke-play events, what a player scores on a specific hole is not important. What is important is what he scores compared to his opponent.

"Some people say you have to just play your own game and let the chips fall," Meyer said. "But it's a lot different. If your opponent hits it out of bounds right in front of you, there is no reason to hit a driver where you might knock it

out of bounds, too. Take a 4-iron, lay up and make bogey and you're probably going to win the hole. There is no reason to be trying to make birdie if the guy is making a 6 or 7.

"There's a lot of strategy and a lot of fun. You're not just playing the golf course, you've got to play your opponent."

Winter Haven's **Bruce Scamehorn** is the defending champion, winning the championship last year at The Loxahatchee Club in Jupiter.

Now it comes to Palma Ceia for the first

"We have not done anything like this in ages," Palma Ceia professional Gil Gonsalves said. "It's probably back to the '50s since we've hosted any Florida State Golf Association events. So it's our turn. It's our duty to give back something to golf."

When **Wyatt Meyer** birdied the final hole Sunday at Innisbrook to claim a one-stroke victory against **Rennie Law** in the Bill Currie Ford Invitational, it continued an amazing year for the 45-year-old amateur.

It began in February with a victory in an 18-hole "Tough Day Tournament," at Avila. Then he finished fifth in the Gasparilla Invitational, won his second consecutive Avila Club Championship, finished second in the Henry Camp in Ocala, successfully defended his Tangerine Invitational title in Brooksville, played on Avila's state club championship team, qualified for the U.S. Amateur as co-medalists and last week successfully defended his Bill Currie title to win the event for the third time.

"I'm getting better with age, I guess," Meyer said. "I don't know. It's kind of funny how it has happened all of a sudden. I guess it just took a while to learn how to win. I started the game late, so the more I play in tournaments and experience being in the last group, the more you learn how to be patient."

Playing on all three Innisbrook courses, Meyer shot 76-73-71—220 to edge Law's 75-76-70—221. **Dick Moore** was third thanks to a tournament-low 68 on the final day after opening 79-80.

# LaCrosse, Corzilius square off for title

TAMPA — And then there were two. Unless a third pops into the picture.

Doug LaCrosse of Tampa and John Corzilius of Nokomis survived two rounds of match play Saturday and will play today for the Florida State Golf Association's Mid-Amateur Championship.

The event at Palma Ceia Country Club, which began Thursday with 100 golfers, features the state's best amateurs 25 years and older. LaCrosse beat defending champion Bruce Scamehorn of Winter Haven 6-5 in Saturday's quarterfinal.

He clinched his semifinal win over George Roat of Windemere when Roat missed 20-foot birdie putt on No. 18 that would have sent the match into overtime.

Corzilius rallied from three holes down with four left to defeat Orlando's Jeff Lindquist in the quarterfinals. He then eased past Tampa's Wyatt Meyer 4-3 in the semifinal. Between rounds, he checked the pro shop to see if his wife had called.

Corzilius has been driving back to his home near Sarasota every night because his wife is eight months pregnant.

Barring premature developments, he said he'll be back for today's 8 a.m. start. GOLF
