

14-Year-Old Golfer Leads State Junior

David Abell of Fort Pierce, 14 years old and still growing as they might say in basketball-rich Indiana, handcuffed par with a superb display of shotmaking and fired a fiveunder-par 67 Monday at Capri Isles Golf Club to lead the Florida State Junior Golf Championship.

Abell's performance put him in ideal position to break one of the tournament's bestkept records — that of being the youngest winner. The mark was set by Sarasota's Gary Koch, who captured the title at 15 and went on to win the championship three years in a row.

The 67 gave Abell a fourshot margin over Bradenton's George DeSear and two other golfers. The tournament ends with another 18-hole round today at Capri Isles, located in Venice.

The State Junior Championship, run by the Florida State Golf Association, hosts boys from the age of 12 through 17. Competition is divided into two age divisions, 12-14 and 15-17, although a golfer in the younger division is still eligible for the overall

Abell, who is six feet tall and weighs 140 pounds, will be 15 in September. He began playing golf when he was six and progressed fast enough to win the 12-14 age group title in this tournament the last two years.

His bogeyless round at Capri Isles featured 14 pars,

There are two sides to every coin. In last Wednesday's column, we noted the fine comportment of the young players in the Florida State Junior Golf Championship being played at Capri Isles Golf Club in Venice. That was on Monday.

I cannot remember in tournament play having seen so many clubs thrown or pounded viciously on the ground, golf bags kicked, or balls swatted and thrown off greens after missed putts. A cardinal courtesy of standing behind the golfer about to hit was constantly violated.

Some kids, (and I use the word advisedly), who were having a bad day and had fallen out of contention started dogging it - just going through the motions with half-hearted attempts at shotmaking. Many parents had taken the time and spent good money for travel and equipment to get these youngsters to the tournament. It's a small reward indeed when your young hopeful doesn't even try

The game of golf, like the game of life, calls for courage.

When the going gets tough, the strong get tougher.


Sure the course was wet and soggy from the recent intemperate rains, but everyone was facing the same problems. Some had disastrous holes but fought to regain the strokes instead of taking refuge in a comedic, "I don't give a darn attitude."

Sarasota's B. J. Jones and Earl Gibson started the final day nine, and eight strokes respectively, behind leader, and eventual winner, David Abell. Both responded with very fine rounds (Jones 67 and Gibson 71) to clinch third and fourth place in the tournament.

That's what the game is all about. Golf (or any other competitive sport for that matter) is supposed to build character, to help us fight our way through life's uneven seas. Golf is also a gentleman's game. Some of the expletives that came from the lips of its young practitioners, tended to belie that thesis.

If I was the parent of one of the competitors who quit out there, it would be a long while before I'd again make the effort and the sacrifice to get him to the action. There's a crying need for discipline in our country today. Webster defines discipline as "training which corrects, molds, streng-

thens or perfects." If your children are participating in some of our organized junior sports programs today be it golf, little league baseball, football, hockey, tennis or what have you, take a closer look at what they are doing and learning. Make corrections where they are called for. And above all let them know that it's not a sin to lose as long as they gave it their best effort all the way.

Toby has a putter that was once Arnold Palmer's, and if Arnie could see the way this young fellow knocks them in from all over the greens, he'd probably want it back. The lad is a natural. 
